# Wisconsin Marriages and Divorces

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### Introduction

This report presents key information about marriages and divorces that occurred in Wisconsin in 2011. It also contains information from selected previous years, as well as information on the number and rate of marriages and divorces, both in Wisconsin and nationally. The sources of data for Wisconsin are marriage and divorce certificates on file with the State Vital Records Office, Office of Health Informatics, Division of Public Health, Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

The collection of marriage and divorce data is mandated by Chapter 69 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Chapter 69 authorizes the Department of Health Services to supervise and direct the collection of these data. This statute also specifies how local registrars are to collect and file certificates of marriage.

The Department of Health Services produced this publication. Staff of the State Vital Records Office, Registration and Statistics Unit, collected and compiled the marriage and divorce records. Joyce Knapton drafted the summaries in this report and produced the computer programs to generate the tables. Patricia Nametz edited the report. The report was prepared under the supervision of John Kiesow, State Registrar, State Vital Records Office, and Jane Kraus, Supervisor, Registration and Statistics Unit, State Vital Records Office.

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# **Key Findings**

- A total of 30,287 marriages occurred in Wisconsin in 2011, representing an increase of 335 marriages from the 29,952 marriages that occurred in 2010. These counts reflect all marriages that occurred in Wisconsin (of both residents and non-residents of the state).
- Until 2011, the number of marriages had declined annually since 1980.
- Wisconsin's marriage rate in 2011 was 5.3 per 1,000 total population, identical to the 2010 rate (5.3). The marriage rate has been gradually declining since 1980, when the rate was 8.7.
- The marriage rate in Wisconsin has been consistently lower than the national rate for more than 80 years.
- The median age for first marriages in 2011 was 26 years for women and 27.5 years for men. In 1960, the median age at first marriage was 20.4 for brides and 22.9 for grooms.
- Since 1960, the bride in a first marriage, on average, has been a year or two younger than the groom.
- In 2011, the months with the highest number of marriages were July, August and September. September was the most popular month to marry. In each of the past seven years, the month with the most marriages averaged approximately 14 percent of that year's total marriages. In those same seven years, the month in which the fewest marriages occurred was January.
- Milwaukee County had the highest number of marriages in 2011 (4,231), followed by Dane County (2,656), Waukesha County (1,827) and Brown County (1,553). These are Wisconsin's four most populous counties. Of these four counties, only Waukesha had a decrease in the number of marriages from 2010 to 2011.
- A total of 16,635 divorces occurred in Wisconsin in 2011, for a divorce rate of 2.9 per 1,000 total population. This is slightly lower than the 2010 rate (3.0).
- In 2011, the ratio of Wisconsin marriages to Wisconsin divorces was 1.8 to 1 (there were 1.8 marriages for each divorce). This ratio has been falling since 1920, when it was 9.2 to 1; it was 6.7 to 1 in 1960; 2.2 to 1 in 1990; and 2.1 to 1 in 2000. The ratio increased slightly from 1.7 in 2010 to 1.8 in 2011.
- The highest number of divorces in 2011 occurred in Milwaukee County (2,343 divorces and 6 annulments), followed by Dane County (1,382 divorces and 8 annulments) and Waukesha County (1,028 divorces and 3 annulments), reflecting the large populations of these three counties.
- Fifty-four percent of all Wisconsin divorces in 2011 involved families with children under 18 years of age. Among divorces involving children, an average of 1.9 children were affected by each divorce.

- The lowest number of marriages occurred in the counties of Florence (28), Iron (29), Menominee (30) and Pepin (46).

- The highest number of divorces in 2011 occurred in Milwaukee County (2,343 divorces and 6 annulments), followed by Dane County (1,382 divorces and 8 annulments) and Waukesha County (1,028 divorces and 3 annulments), reflecting the large populations of these three counties.
- The lowest number of divorces occurred in the counties of Iron (14 divorces), Pepin (18 divorces) and Florence (22 divorces). There were no divorces or annulments in Menominee County in 2011.

**Technical Notes** 

## **Marriage Reporting Requirements**

The following is a brief outline of the sequence of events which take place when a marriage occurs in Wisconsin:

- The filing party (officiant) must register the certificate of marriage with the local Register of Deeds (where the marriage took place) within 3 days after the event.
- The local Register of Deeds must transmit the marriage certificate to the State Registrar within 10 working days after its receipt.

# **Divorce Reporting Requirements**

The following is what takes place when a divorce occurs in Wisconsin:

• At the end of every biweekly period, the filing party (clerk of any court) must send to the State Registrar a report of every divorce or annulment of marriage granted during that period.
