Limitations


- 1. Billing data for 2023 are not complete; we give providers up to 365 days to submit claims for a service
- 2. Demographic data like gender and race are limited by the available response categories, and because members may not be required to report the information to us

Key Services


Service	Details
Comprehensive Treatment	Early intervention, high number of hours per week, duration > 1 year Typically for children age 9 and under
Focused Treatment	Focuses on specific skills, smaller number of hours per week, shorter duration Available for all ages
Family Treatment Guidance	Trains caregivers to use treatment techniques to teach new skills, reduce challenging behavior, and generalize and maintain skills learned through treatment


Level of Care by Unique Members




2023 Unique Members by Age Range

Billing Data Basics

Services are billed in "units" of time.

1 unit = 15 minutes

4 units = 1 hour

 Each unit of time is billed with a numeric billing code that indicates what happened during that unit of time

Billing Data Basics

• The three most commonly used billing codes in Behavioral Treatment are:

```
97153 = direct 1-on-1 treatment
```

97155 = protocol modification

97156 = family treatment guidance

Both comprehensive and focused treatment use these codes to indicate if the service was 1-on-1, protocol modification, or family treatment guidance.



2023 Billing Units per Level of Care







Members' Home Zip Codes



Rendering Providers' Zip Codes








Who Travels?


- When the benefit launched in 2016, almost all providers traveled to members' homes to provide service.
- Today, many providers offer primarily clinicbased services, which means members travel to the provider's location.




