


Expanding Coverage and **Ensuring Access**

Medicaid Expansion

- State GPR Savings \$1.6 billion
- Expands coverage to approximately 90,000 Wisconsinites
 - Approximately 50,000 of those individuals are currently uninsured

Other Medicaid Provisions

- Tribal and County Enrollment Functions \$11.1 million
- Payments to Hospitals \$321 million
- Critical Access Payments for Medicaid Dental Providers - \$35.9 million

Other Medicaid Provisions

Tribal Shared Savings - \$5.5 million

Investing in Behavioral Health

Expanding Behavioral Health Services

- Medicaid Rates for Behavioral Health and Suicide Prevention Services - \$40 million
- Psycho-social Rehabilitation Benefit \$2 million

Treating and Preventing Substance Use Disorders

- Improve Access to Medication-Assisted Treatment -\$12.4 million
 - Includes funding for Tribal MAT provider
- Room and Board for Residential Substance
 Treatment \$6.5 million
- Medicaid Coverage of Acupuncture \$3.2 million

Ensuring Access to Behavioral Health Crisis Care

Supporting Local Crisis Response

- Regional Crisis Centers \$12.6 Million
- Regional Crisis Stabilization Facilities \$5 million
- Crisis Phone Lines and Peer-Run "Warm-lines" \$2.4 million

Linking Law Enforcement and Behavioral Health

- Emergency Response Collaboration Grant \$2.5 million
- Crisis Intervention Training Grant \$750,000

Investing in Public Health

Funding for Communicable Disease Response

- Funding for local and Tribal communicable disease response - \$10m
- Funding for state communicable disease response
 - \$3.6m

Protecting Kids

- Childhood lead poisoning prevention
 - Ongoing funding for Lead Safe Homes Program
 - Windows Plus Program \$2 million
 - Birth to 3 Eligibility expansion \$9.9 million
- Tobacco Use Prevention- \$2 million

Supporting Caregivers and Long-Term Care Providers

Long Term Care

Supporting Older Adults in the Community

- Tribal Aging and Disability Resource Specialists and County Aging and Disability Resource Centers - \$7 million
- Dementia Care Specialist Expansion \$3.5 million
 - Includes funding for 7 new Tribal specialists

Long Term Care

- Nursing Home rate increase \$241 million
- Funding for Direct Care
 - Family Care Supplement \$77.8 million
 - Personal Care Services \$77.8 million
- Eliminate Children's Long-Term Support (CLTS) waitlist

Advancing Health Equity

Healthy Women, Healthy Babies

- Women's Health Block Grant Funding
 - Restoration of Funding \$400,000
 - Elimination of restrictions on grant recipients
- Extend post-partum coverage for pregnant women in Medicaid - \$21 million
- Coverage for doula services \$1 million

Health Equity and Minority Health Grants

- Health Equity Community Grants to Local and Tribal Health Departments - \$15 million
- Minority Health Grants \$8 million


Community Health

- Community Health Workers \$29.3 million
 - Grant funding \$15 million
 - Medicaid coverage \$14.3 million
- Community Health Benefit \$25.5 million
