Steps of Home Visit to assess the child and family within their environment:

- 1) Provide information on the effects of lead on children and where in the home you might find lead hazards.
- 2) Walk through the home with the Visual Triggers of Paint Hazards tool to identify potential lead hazards. (Optional: Test the paint or dust in the window wells for the presence of lead.)
- 3) Vacuum the windows and floors below windows with a HEPA vacuum.
- 4) Follow with wet cleaning method demonstration.

Identify areas accessible to and frequented by the child. Ask where the child sleeps, or will sleep, play, eat. Focus on windows in those areas (such as a high chair near a window), and floors where child will be crawling. Entry way floors are a site of hazards if the porch has chipping and peeling paint. Ask about areas where recent renovation, remodeling, or repainting of painted/varnished surfaces has been done.	If there is chipping or peeling paint or paint on friction services like floors, test with swab if desired and demonstrate lead hazard reduction techniques (wet cleaning, HEPA vacuum, block access, remove). Observe if windows have any mini or vertical blinds.	Test with a lead check swab. If positive, recommend removal of the blinds from the child's access.		Lead check swab

Ask about any other sources based on what you see around the home (e.g., sidewalk chalk, imported candies, etc.).	Provide information about the potential for containing lead and recommend throwing away.
