## Reasons for CLTS FS Updates

- Incorporated changes over the last six years.
  - Advances in technology.
  - Updates to testing.
  - Tips, system change notices, and GovDelivery messages.
- Clarified all process and procedures.
- Modified to concise, transparent language.

## Reasons for CLTS FS Updates

- Updated for inclusion and equity initiatives.
- Amended for family and person-centered philosophy and language.
- Further aligned to:
  - State and Federal Institutional Levels of Care.
  - Adult Long-Term Care system and screen.

## CLTS FS and Quality Improvement

Minimize time with not functionally eligible (NFE) reviews.

Provide guidelines for internal county waiver agency (CWA) review.

Reduce time and effort to complete screen.

Increase screener training and outreach.

Added collaboration with stakeholders.

Semi-Annual Review of the CLTS FS and Clinical Instructions.

Module 6: ADLs and IADLs

### Bathing:

 New Question-Exhibits extreme behaviors to the point that the child does not regularly perform bathing tasks at an age appropriate level.

### Dressing:

- New Question-Needs physical assistance with getting clothing on/off.
- Children ages nine and older who need an adult to assist with buttons, zippers, and snaps.
- Independent in dressing but takes added time, supervision or adaptations.

### Grooming

- More description has been give as to what can be included, including hair care.
- New Question-Exhibits extreme behaviors to the point that the child does not regularly perform grooming tasks at an age appropriate level.

### Eating:

- Needs one-on-one monitoring to prevent choking, aspiration, or other serious complications.
- Will overstuff mouth with food, often resulting in gagging or vomiting.
- Has current eating disorder requiring one-on-one monitoring at meals.
- Avoids certain foods, gags, or spits out foods due to oral sensitivities.

### Toileting:

No Changes.

### Mobility and Transfers:

- New Question- Unable to ambulate independently.
- Requires another person to help hold the child up while they walk. Over age six, unable to walk long distances due to fatigue from the significant effort involved in ambulating.

### Communication:

- Added examples under questions.
- Added tests under the assessment tools category.
  - DAY C-II, Greenspan Lewis, Rossetti-many which Birth to Three use.
  - Other Category for tests.
- Aligned cohort questions to percent of delay in testing.

### Learning:


- Added examples under questions.
- Added tests and Other category.
- If IQ score above 75, a screener can still check questions.

### Social competency and self-direction:

- Incorporation of social competency tip.
- Clarification of questions.
- Addition of self-direction.

### Capacity for Independent Living:

- New umbrella category for money management and food preparation.
- This IADL will appear beginning at age 14.




Social Competency/Self-Direction ?
* Social Competency/Self-Direction (14 years to 17 years, 9 months)
Is not self confident in social situations.  Is not comfortable enough to express his/her opinion in everyday peer interactions.
Does not assert social autonomy from parents.  Does not make decisions about interests, activities or ideas independent from his/her parents.
Repeatedly does not avoid situations that are likely to result in trouble.  Gets involved in situations that have caused trouble in the past or does not avoid peer pressure in going along with a bad idea.
Does not control his/her temper in disagreements with other children.  Cannot disagree with peers without escalating into a temper tantrum or running away from the situation.
Does not identify one special friend.  Will play with anyone but does not have a best friend.
Does not participate in groups at play.  Prefer to play by himself/herself rather than be part of a group.
Does not seek information or assistance from parents or teachers.  Does not ask for help (verbally or non-verbally) or seek information from a trusted adult.
Does not have an awareness of another child's need for help or feelings.  Does not recognize when another child is happy, sad or hurt.
Does not assume different roles in play.  Does not engage in make believe or pretend play (e.g., pretends to play a mom, dad, cat or dog).
Does not question rules or punishments viewed as unfair.  Unable to express his/her sense of unfairness or simply doesn't care when things are unfair.
Does not make transitions from one activity to another without disrupting others.  Unable to make transitions without having his/her discomfort affect others in the group.
Does not show concern for the feelings of friends.  Does not notice another person's feelings and offer care or comfort.
Does not express an interest in spending time with similar aged peers.  Isolates himself/herself from peers.

## Module 9: Screen Time and Notes

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- Screen completion date:
  - The screen completion date is the date when all sections of the CLTS FS were completed by the certified screener.
    - Not when started into Functional Screen Information Access (FSIA).
    - Not when the screen is calculated.
- 45 day timeline calculates from date of referral to screen completion date.

- Dates and initials appear with notes, in desired format:
  - Newest notes at the top of the note section.
  - ◆ Date (MM/DD/YY) Notes Initials.

Steps to take if the Result is NFE.

- Do not send the screen results to iChange.
- Self-review screen for accuracy.
- Have a peer in your agency review.
- If questions remain, email the CLTS FS mailbox.
- All NFE results continue to be reviewed by the Bureau of Children's Services (BCS).

- Steps to take if the result is Functionally Eligible:
  - Send results to iChange (or results will be sent in 30 days).
  - Document results in Program Participation
     System (PPS) if applicable.
  - Discuss results with family for all eligible programs.
  - Begin referral, enrollment, and/or service planning for interested programs based on strengths and needs.

Coordinating eligibility between programs

- If the screen that was completed changed eligibility results for other programs, work with those programs to alert, verify, and amend.
  - Children's Community Options Program (CCOP), CLTS Waiver Program, Katie Beckett Medicaid.
  - Comprehensive Community Services (CCS).
