## How do I complete the Student Immunization Record?



Call your doctor or local health department and make a **vaccine visit** as early as possible.



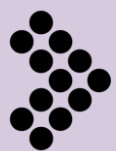
Ask your doctor to fill out the [Student Immunization Record form](#) (F-04020L) and then you **sign** it.



**Give** the Student Immunization Record form to the school at the beginning of the new school year.



**Call** your doctor's office or local health department if you **need help** or more information.



You can track and print your student's vaccine record through the [Wisconsin Immunization Registry](#).

## What resources are available to help me pay for vaccines?

The **Vaccines for Children (VFC) Program** provides free vaccines for children ages 18 years and younger who are not insured, Medicaid (or BadgerCare) eligible, American Indian, or Alaska Native. Visit the [VFC webpage](#) to learn more.

\*Vaccine requirements may be waived for health, religious, or personal conviction reasons. Find a waiver [here](#).

\*\*Varicella vaccine is not required if the student has had chicken pox diagnosis by a qualified health care provider (MD, DO, NP, or PA). If a student has an existing parental report of varicella disease on file, that is acceptable. Any new entrants will require documentation from a qualified health care provider.
