
2023 Summary Report

HIV surveillance data provide important information for planning HIV prevention and care services. The data show trends and priority populations in order to focus resources. During 2023, 83 people were newly diagnosed with HIV in Milwaukee. Out of the 83 people, 17% were diagnosed at a community-based agency or health department. Milwaukee Comparisons

Milwaukee had a lower HIV diagnosis rate compared to similar cities.

Although trends do not show a significant increase over time, these populations should be emerging priorities:



Sexual contact was the most common HIV transmission mode.

Percentage of HIV diagnoses by gender* and estimated transmission category*, Milwaukee, 2023




*Data have been statistically adjusted to account for those with unknown transmission category. No cases for transgender men in 2023. This figure uses gender identity rather than sex assigned at birth.

A lower percentage of people of color ages 30 and older were virally suppressed. *


HIV Care Continuum - Care Outcomes, Milwaukee, 2023



^{*}Virally suppressed means having less than 200 copies of HIV per milliliter of blood. People whose last viral load test was prior to 2023 or who did not have a viral load test done in 2023 were considered to have unsuppressed viral loads. Race or ethnicity alone does not make someone more or less likely to be virally suppressed.

Most people living with HIV received some HIV care and were virally suppressed.


HIV Care Continuum - Retention and Care Outcomes, Milwaukee, 2023
