Proposed Use of Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (MHBG) Bipartisan Safer Communities Act (BSCA) Funds

Wisconsin has seen an increase in the need for crisis intervention services across the state. The pandemic continues to have lasting impact on the mental health for people in Wisconsin and crisis services in particular have been a critical resource for Wisconsinites. Using the BSCA funds Wisconsin plans to continue investments into the public crisis intervention system in the state. Wisconsin plans to utilize the 2025 award (estimated to be \$1,146,520) in Federal Fiscal Year 2025 (9/30/24-9/29/25). Wisconsin's plan is to enhance crisis mental health services for adults and youth, to enhance key training initiatives, and provide additional support for young adults with Early Serious Mental Illness.

Wisconsin will utilize the MHBG BSCA funding to expand access to Regional Crisis Stabilization Facilities (RCSF). RCSFs are a facility and program operated within a defined region of the state which provides crisis stabilization services for adults with behavioral health conditions. In Wisconsin, counties are responsible for responding to individuals experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis. Crisis response often takes the form of services provided to the individual within their community, but in some cases, the individual undergoes emergency detention at an inpatient facility, including the Winnebago Mental Health Institute. Wisconsin will be supporting the development or expansion of dedicated RCFS that address regional needs, keeping stabilization options closer to the individual's home community and natural supports. Through this initiative, unnecessary psychiatric hospitalizations can be avoided and pressure on an already overburdened state hospital system can be reduced.

The overarching goal of each RCSF is to provide crisis intervention services, meeting individual needs in the least restrictive setting. Through the provision of RCSF services, it is expected that many individuals on a track toward more restrictive services could be diverted and psychiatric hospitalization and jail settings can be avoided. An effective stabilization facility will, to the extent possible, be prepared and equipped to safely serve any individual, regardless of the type of behavioral health crisis. The RCSF will also maintain collaborative relationships with 988 call centers, crisis programs, other residential crisis stabilization programs, inpatient facilities in their region, state hospitals, first responders, and emergency departments. The RCSF is able to provide step-down services from inpatient behavioral health hospitalization to help an individual transition back to their home community.

Wisconsin will also utilize the MHBG BSCA funding to expand access to Youth Crisis Stabilization Facilities (YCSF). YCSFs serve youth ages 17 and under who are experiencing a mental health crisis. In Wisconsin, there is a shortage of community-based services for youth who are experiencing a mental health crisis. Many of these youth are placed on an emergency detention to deescalate the crisis and stabilize the youth. However, this level of treatment exceeds the clinical needs of many youths and often is used because of a lack of more appropriate types of treatment options in the youth's community.

Wisconsin county emergency mental health services programs, along with other partners, support the development of YCSFs as a clinically appropriate treatment option to address this existing mental health services need. This need is for short-term (on average 5-7 days) residential placement where professionals assist youth to deescalate from a mental health crisis, as well as reduce the likelihood of future crises. The YCSF will collaborate with counties, tribes, families, schools, service providers, and other professionals to support the mental health needs of the youth upon return to their community.

A third effort Wisconsin plans to expand with the MHBG BSCA funding is a Comprehensive Dialectical Behavioral Therapy (DBT) Training for Teams pilot project. Comprehensive Dialectical Behavioral Therapy (DBT) Training for Teams is a series of trainings and consultations that prepares clinicians in the state to provide DBT to fidelity. Training will be provided to approximately 16 teams that consist of 2-4 individuals from one organization or partnering organizations. DBT training includes modules about teaching mindfulness, distress tolerance, interpersonal effectiveness, and emotional regulation skills to prepare practitioners to deliver services and lead effective groups. Having a statewide roster of trained practitioners that can offer these services will assist with managing exacerbations of behavioral health needs and suicide crisis behaviors. This additional funding would allow for expanded outreach and training for crisis programs and the state's 988 providers to encourage referrals to DBT providers.

Wisconsin will also utilize at least 10% of the award to support evidence-based programs that address the needs of individuals with early serous mental illness. Coordinated Specialty Care programs have been developed and supported in Wisconsin since 2014 and Wisconsin plans to utilize the MHBG BSCA funding to continue to expand access to those services for youth and young adults experiencing a First Episode Psychosis.

15. Crisis Services - Required for MHBG, Requested for SUPTRS BG

Narrative Question

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is directed by Congress to set aside 5 percent of the Mental Health Block Grant (MHBG) allocation for each state to support evidence-based crisis systems. The statutory language outlines the following for the 5 percent set-aside:

....to support evidenced-based programs that address the crisis care needs of individuals with serious mental illnesses and children with serious emotional disturbances, which may include individuals (including children and adolescents) experiencing mental health crises demonstrating serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance, as applicable.

CORE ELEMENTS: At the discretion of the single State agency responsible for the administration of the program, the funds may be used to expend some or all of the core crisis care service components, as applicable and appropriate, including the following:

- · Crisis call centers
- 24/7 mobile crisis services
- Crisis stabilization programs offering acute care or subacute care in a hospital or appropriately licensed facility, as determined by such State, with referrals to inpatient or outpatient care.

STATE FLEXIBILITY: In lieu of expanding 5 percent of the amount the State receives pursuant to this section for a fiscal year to support evidence based programs as required a State may elect to expend not less than 10 percent of such amount to support such programs by the end of two consecutive fiscal years.

A crisis response system will have the capacity to prevent, recognize, respond, de-escalate, and follow-up from crises across a continuum, from crisis planning, to early stages of support and respite, to crisis stabilization and intervention, to post-crisis follow-up and support for the individual and their family. SAMHSA expects that states will build on the emerging and growing body of evidence for effective community-based crisis-intervention and response systems. Given the multi-system involvement of many individuals with M/SUD issues, the crisis system approach provides the infrastructure to improve care coordination, stabilization service to support reducing distress, promoting skill development and outcomes, manage costs, and better invest resources.

SAMHSA developed <u>Crisis Services: Meeting Needs, Saving Lives</u>, which includes "<u>National Guidelines for Behavioral Health Crisis Care</u>: Best Practice Toolkit" as well as an <u>Advisory: Peer Support Services in Crisis Care</u> and other related National Association of State Mental Health Programs Directors (NASMHPD) papers on crisis services. SAMHSA also developed "<u>National Guidelines for Child and Youth Behavioral Health Crisis Care</u>" which offers best practicies, implementation strategies, and practical guidance for the design and development of services that meet the needs of children, youth and their families experiencing a behavioral health crisis.</u> Please note that this set aside funding is dedicated for the core set of crisis services as directed by Congress. Nothing precludes states from utilizing more than 5 percent of its MHBG funds for crisis services for individuals with serious mental illness or children with serious emotional disturbances. If states have other investments for crisis services, they are encouraged to coordinate those programs with programs supported by this new 5 percent set aside. This coordination will help ensure services for individuals are swiftly identified and are engaged in the core crisis care elements.

1. Briefly narrate your state's crisis system. For all regions/areas of your state, include a description of access to the crisis call centers, availability of mobile crisis and behavioral health first responder services, utilization of crisis receiving and stabilization centers.

In Wisconsin, Crisis Intervention, administered under DHS 34, subchapter III administrative rule, is available through three modalities, at minimum: 24/7 telephone services; 8 hours per day, 5-day per week walk-in service; and 8-hour per day, 7-day per week mobile services, including mobile crisis outreach. Programs certified under subchapter III are eligible to claim reimbursement for service provision through Wisconsin Medicaid through an established fee-for-service rate structure and private insurers as well (Wisconsin administrative rule requires Crisis Intervention Services to be covered under Casualty Insurance: INS 3.37). Most of Wisconsin's 72 counties have programs certified under DHS 34, subchapter III, either as a certified entity themselves or by contracting with a private agency or adjacent county. Crisis stabilization services are an optional service which certified programs may provide and receive reimbursement for. In Wisconsin there are approximately 23 crisis stabilization facilities operated by counties throughout Wisconsin, five regionalized crisis stabilization facilities that are supported through DHS grant funds, and three certified youth crisis stabilization facilities, two of which are supported through DHS grant funds.

There are one urban and five rural counties that do not participate in subchapter III services, yet all Wisconsinites have access to crisis call center services through the 988 Wisconsin Lifeline.

Eligibility for subchapter III crisis service is broadly defined as "a situation caused by an individual's apparent mental disorder which results in a high level of stress or anxiety for the individual, persons providing care for the individual or the public which cannot be resolved by the available coping methods of the individual or by the efforts of those providing ordinary care or support for the individual." Wisconsin Crisis programs are also capable of preparing and implementing a "Crisis Plan" for "an individual at high risk of experiencing a mental health crisis so that, if a crisis occurs, staff responding to the situation will have the information and resources they need to meet the person's individual service needs." Thus, Crisis programs provide both emergency responses to an emergent situation as well as anticipatory crisis planning.

Programs are required to provide linkage, coordination, and follow-up services. Consequently, these programs are making referrals and connecting individuals and their families to mainstream resources to stabilize a crisis and to prevent the emergence of another. Crisis services have enabled diversion from many unnecessary psychiatric hospitalizations. In Wisconsin, for an individual to be involuntarily hospitalized under an emergency detention, the county department of community programs must provide a "crisis assessment" and approve the transfer to a treatment facility. In almost all cases, that authority is with the Crisis Intervention program, delegated to a mental health professional, Wisconsin Stats. Chapter 51.15 (2) (c). This requirement affords an opportunity to evaluate the necessity for a hospitalization or alternatively to employ a more trauma informed least restrictive alternative such as a community safety plan or a crisis stabilization option, either in-vivo or in a residential setting. Stabilization in place or use of facility-based, residential stabilization resources are optional services for Subchapter III certified programs. Many counties have residential stabilization facilities for adults, either one to two bed county-licensed Adult Family Homes (AFHs) or larger-state three to four bed AFHs or five to 16 bed state-licensed Community-Based Residential Facilities (CBRFs).

Regionalized crisis stabilization facilities (RCSF) are currently operating in all five regions of the state however, based on geography may not serve all counties within the region. These RCSFs are partially funded through a DHS grant. 45 out of 72 of Wisconsin's counties have an active contract with at least one regional crisis stabilization facility. Additionally, there are three operating, certified, youth crisis stabilization facilities in the state which provide short term, crisis stabilization services for youth. 34 out of 72 of Wisconsin's counties have active contracts with at least one youth crisis stabilization facility.

b. Briefly explain your stages of implementation selections here.

Someone to talk to – Majority Implementation - 90% of Wisconsin counties have certified crisis programs and operate 24/7 crisis lines allowing persons in crisis to get quickly connected to local, county-based resources when in crisis.

Someone to respond – Majority Implementation – 94.12% of Wisconsin counties have certified crisis programs which requires them to operate mobile crisis programs at the minimum standard of 24 hours a day 7 days a week. Many counties, especially those in larger counties with more access to resources offering expanding mobile crisis services, including co-responder models, mobile crisis teaming models, and enhanced linkage and follow up.

Safe Place to go or be – Partial Implementation – With approximately 23 crisis stabilization facilities and 5 regionalized crisis stabilization facilities it is estimated that at minimum, 44 counties have access to at least one crisis stabilization facility and 34 counties have active contracts with at least one youth crisis stabilization facility.

1. Someone to talk to: Crisis call Capacity

Number of locally based crisis call Centers in state: 65 of Wisconsin's 72 counties have Medicaid reimbursable, certified crisis programs which requires them to operate crisis call lines. While many of these lines aren't defined "centers" they do need to provide 24-hour, 7 day a week phone support, information, counseling, intervention, emergency service coordination, and referrals to individuals and families in crisis.

In the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline network: Wisconsin has one primary 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline center that answers all calls, chats and texts, the 988 Wisconsin Lifeline and one backup center, both are operated by Family Services of Northeast Wisconsin.

Not in the suicide lifeline network: In 2023 Wisconsin launched a peer run warmline, Uplift Wisconsin. Uplift Wisconsin provides free and confidential peer support to assist individuals with mental health and/or substance use issues that are having increases in symptoms and/or stressors and need someone to talk to that will listen, help problem solve, and provide information and resources. Uplift Wisconsin encompasses enough resources to serve the entire state, with one statewide number and multiple telephone lines that connects callers to a certified peer specialist who is trained and certified to provide non-judgmental peer support, 7 days a week from 12:00 pm – 12:00 am.

b. Number of Crisis Call Centers with follow up Protocols in place

All 65 of Wisconsin's DHS 34 certified crisis programs are required to provide linkage, coordination, and follow-up services to persons in crisis as needed and appropriate which may be outlined in their emergency mental health services written plan for providing coordinating emergency mental health services within the county. The 988 Wisconsin Lifeline provides follow-up services to callers, chatters, and texters based on context of the call, need for follow up, and only with the help seekers consent.

c. Percent of 911 calls that are coded out as BH related

Wisconsin currently does not collect data on 988 calls that are coded out as being behavioral health related. Based on a nationwide report, "one recent analysis of eight cities found that between 21 and 38 percent of 911 calls are related to mental health, substance use, homelessness, and other quality of life concerns".

Wisconsin recognizes that person's contacting 911 with mental, behavioral, or crisis related concerns may be more appropriately serviced by an alternative, crisis related service. To meet this need, using 988 related grant funds Wisconsin has a 988/911 Outreach Coordinator who is collaborating with 988 and Wisconsin public safety answering points to improve collaboration and identify coordination efforts to streamline persons in crisis to more appropriate services to address their mental, behavioral, or crisis related needs. Additionally, Wisconsin's 988 provider has a team of five outreach staff who assist in these coordination efforts.

2. Someone to respond: Number of communities that have mobile behavioral health crisis mobile capacity (in comparison to the total number of communities) 94.12% of Wisconsin's 72 counties have Medicaid reimbursable, certified crisis programs which requires them to have mobile crisis services available for at minimum, 8 hours a day, 7 days a week during a period of time identified in their emergency mental health services plan when mobile services would be most needed. Starting January 1st, 2024 county crisis programs have the option to enroll with Medicaid to receive an enhanced benefit which allows billing for a team of up to three mobile crisis providers, one requirement to receive the enhanced benefit is to have mobile crisis teaming available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. There are currently four counties enrolled as enhanced programs and one in process.

a. Independent of first responder structures (police, paramedic, fire)

All 94.12% of Wisconsin's mobile crisis programs are independent of first responders however, many of these programs work closely with first responder with many referrals coming from law enforcement. Based on the 2022 Crisis Survey of all the mobile crisis responses that occurred in 2022, where law enforcement was not the referral source, the mean percent that requested law enforcement accompaniment was 52.2%.

b. Integrated with first responder structures (police, paramedic, fire)

This was not a data point collected on the 2022 Crisis Survey. There are between 6-15 co-responder models in Wisconsin that integrate crisis or mental health works with other first responders.

c. Number that employs peers

Based on 2022 Crisis Survey data the following peer supports were used in county crisis programs (calls, mobile response, crisis stabilization):

- i. Certified peer specialists = 12 | (17.65%)
- ii. Non-certified peer supports = 5 | (7.35%)
- iii. Certified parent peer specialists = 2 | (2.94%)
- iv. Recovery coaches = 9 | (13.24%)
- v. No peer supports used = 46 | (67.65%)

Wisconsin DHS recently conducted a survey aimed at peers to better understand the peer landscape as it relates to peers working in crisis.

- 4. Safe place to go or to be:
- a. Number of Emergency Departments

As of 2019 data Wisconsin has approximately 156 emergency departments.

b. Number of Emergency Departments that operate a specialized behavioral health component.

Wisconsin has one psychiatric emergency hospital located in Milwaukee, WI.

c. Number of Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Centers (short term, 23-hour units that can diagnose and stabilize individuals in crisis) Wisconsin has approximately 23 crisis stabilization facilities that are county operated or directly contracted by counties. Most of these crisis stabilization facilities are licensed as community based residential facilities or adult family homes to provide short term, billable, community-based crisis services to clients. Wisconsin DHS funds an additional 5 adult, regionalized crisis stabilization facilities. Wisconsin has three youth crisis stabilization facilities certified under DHS 50, two of which are partially funded through DHS grants.

3. Based on SAMHSA's National Guidelines for Behavioral Health Crisis Care, explain how the state will develop the crisis system.

Wisconsin continues to develop and enhance the state's crisis system based on the Crisis Now model and guidelines developed by SAMHSA. The 988 Wisconsin Lifeline is a primary area of focus as it's often the initial touchpoint for individuals in crisis. With 988 now entering its third year of operation in Wisconsin, we are focusing on the integration of 988 within the Wisconsin's broader system of care, especially as it relates to public safety answering points, mobile crisis dispatch, and facility-based crisis stabilization services. With mobile crisis response available in most of the state, there is focus on enhancement of these services which include mobile crisis teaming response, response in rural and underserved areas or underserved populations, 24/7 response, and enhanced follow-up. Crisis stabilization efforts in Wisconsin are being enhanced through regionalized approaches to address geographical service gaps and improve access, this includes youth crisis stabilization. Wisconsin recently passed Act 249 which grants DHS administrative rule making authority for the establishment of Crisis Urgent Care and Observation Centers as a new, Medicaid reimbursable facility type which will be able to operate and bill Medicaid external to counties, which is a big step forward from our county-based system. These facilities will be intended to admit voluntary and involuntary clients with LE drop off capabilities, and no medical clearance requirement. Act 249 also grants DHS administrative rule making authority for the establishment of Crisis Hostels to encourage crisis stabilization services that are 23 hours and less.

4. Briefly describe the proposed/planned activities utilizing the 5 percent set aside.

100% of the 5% set aside is going to support the 988 Wisconsin Lifeline.

21. State Planning/Advisory Council and Input on the Mental Health/Substance use disorder Block Grant Application- Required for MHBG

Narrative Question

Each state is required to establish and maintain a state Mental Health Planning/Advisory Council to carry out the statutory functions as described in 42 U.S. C. 300x-3 for adults with SMI and children with SED. To meet the needs of states that are integrating services supported by MHBG and SUPTRS BG, SAMHSA is recommending that states expand their Mental Health Advisory Council to include substance misuse prevention, SUD treatment, and recovery representation, referred to here as an Advisory/Planning Council (PC). SAMHSA encourages states to expand their required Council's comprehensive approach by designing and implementing regularly scheduled collaborations with an existing substance misuse prevention, SUD treatment, and recovery advisory council to ensure that the council reviews issues and services for persons with, or at risk, for substance misuse and SUDs. To assist with implementing a PC, SAMHSA has created Best Practices for State Behavioral

Health Planning Councils: The Road to Planning Council Integration. 1

Planning Councils are required by statute to review state plans and implementation reports; and submit any recommended modifications to the state. Planning councils monitor, review, and evaluate, not less than once each year, the allocation and adequacy of mental health services within the state. They also serve as an advocate for individuals with M/SUD problems. SAMHSA requests that any recommendations for modifications to the application or comments to the implementation report that were received from the Planning Council be submitted to SAMHSA, regardless of whether the state has accepted the recommendations. The documentation, preferably a letter signed by the Chair of the Planning Council, should state that the Planning Council reviewed the application and implementation report and should be transmitted as attachments by the state.

 - The Wisconsin Council on Mental Health (WCMH) is directly involved in the development and review of state behavioral health plans and initiatives through ongoing conversations at the Council's bi-monthly meetings and ongoing committee meetings. During the WCMH July meeting, staff from the BPTR provided an overview of the block grant. A draft of the application was also provided directly to the members of the WCMH in August to provide feedback on an ongoing basis. BPTR provides the annual report for review to the WCMH each years as well.
- 2. What mechanism does the state use to plan and implement community mental health treatment, substance misuse prevention, SUD treatment, and recovery support services?
 - Initial planning steps involve the creation of a Mental Health and Substance Use Needs Assessment. The Bureau of Prevention Treatment and Recovery further collaborates with the State Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (SCAODA) to inform the state's plans. The BPTR provides briefings on Substance Use treatment, recovery, and prevention services at SCAODA, and its sub-committees, meetings throughout the calendar year.
- 3. Has the Council successfully integrated substance misuse prevention and SUD treatment and recovery or co-occurring disorder issues, concerns, and activities into its work?

- 5. Please describe the duties and responsibilities of the Council, including how it gathers meaningful input from people in recovery, families, and other important stakeholders, and how it has advocated for individuals with SMI or SED.

The Wisconsin Council on Mental Health (WCMH) has several duties and responsibilities, as specified Wis. Stat. §51.02. The Council evaluates and reviews the Wisconsin mental health system's progress towards achieving improved client outcomes and the adequacy of mental health services in the state. The Council also oversees state compliance with federal Public Law 102-321. In addition, the Council participates in developing, monitoring, and evaluating the implementation of the state block grant plan. Other duties include reviewing all DHS plans for services affecting persons with mental illness, monitoring implementation of the plans, and serving as an advocate for persons of all ages with mental illness. The Council operates six committees: the Executive Council Committee, the Access & Quality Committee, the Children and Youth Committee, the Criminal Justice Committee, the Legislative and Policy Committee, and the Nominating Committee. Members of the council are joined on these committees by additional advocates, individuals with lived experience, and family members of persons with mental illness.

The WCMH and committees regularly invite outside advocacy groups, researchers, and members of the public to attend, provide information, and comment at their meetings. Members of the WCMH and committees regularly meet with DHS leadership and State lawmakers to discuss behavioral health needs and services in Wisconsin. The WCMH reviews state and federal mental health legislation and communicates with legislators on behalf of people in recovery, consumers, and families.

The State Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (SCAODA) is statutorily mandated to provide statewide leadership and coordination on substance use disorder issues. SCAODA is responsible for reviewing pending legislation, developing a four-year plan to implement its priorities, reviewing the biennial budget, and making recommendations to the governor and legislature. SCAODA has five standing committees—the Executive Committee, the Diversity Committee, the Intervention and Treatment Committee, the Prevention Committee, and the Planning and Funding Committee. The Diversity Committee has a standing subcommittee on the deaf, deaf/blind, and hard of hearing and a standing subcommittee on cultural competency; the Intervention and Treatment Committee has a standing subcommittee on Children, Youth, and Families; and the Prevention Committee has a standing subcommittee on epidemiology. SCAODA from time to time establishes ad hoc committees.

During 2023-2024, the WCMH and the SCAODA both made efforts to study and learn more about how the two Councils can make an impact on addressing inequity, racism, and underserved populations. The WCMH invited speakers from several agencies and organizations that provide services to underserved populations. Both the SCAODA and WCMH have formed workgroups to address diversity, equity, and inclusion. Both the WCMH and SCAODA have a representative attend the partner's council meetings to provide updates on their activities to help bridge the work being done by the two councils.

The Wisconsin Council on Mental Health (WCMH) is the statutorily-mandated, Governor-appointed mental health advisory council for Wisconsin. The WCMH is authorized to advise the Governor, Legislature and state agencies on the use of state and federal resources as well as provision and administration of mental health programs and services. One of the major duties of the WCMH is advising Wisconsin's Department of Health Services (DHS) on the expenditure of federal funds received under the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (MHBG). Additionally, the WCMH serves as an advocate for all persons in Wisconsin affected by mental illness.

Wisconsin's Fiscal Year 2025 MHBG and Substance Use Prevention, Treatment and Recovery Block Grant (SUPTRS BG) Plan and Application were provided to the WCMH in August of 2024. The materials were also provided the WCMH's partner council, the State Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (SCAODA). Representatives from DHS provided a presentation on the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant at our July 17 meeting. 23. Syringe Services Program (SSP) - Required if planning for approved use of SUBG Funding for SSP in FY 25

Narrative Question:

The Substance Use Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Services Block Grant (SUPTRS BG) restriction^{1,2} on the use of federal funds for programs distributing sterile needles or syringes (referred to as syringe services programs (SSP)) was modified by the **Consolidated Appropriations Act**, 2018 (P.L. 115-141) signed by President Trump on March 23, 2018³.

Section 520. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Act, no funds appropriated in this Act shall be used to purchase sterile needles or syringes for the hypodermic injection of any illegal drug: Provided, that such limitation does not apply to the use of funds for elements of a program other than making such purchases if the relevant State or local health department, in consultation with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, determines that the State or local jurisdiction, as applicable, is experiencing, or is at risk for, a significant increase in hepatitis infections or an HIV outbreak due to injection drug use, and such program is operating in accordance with State and local law.

A state experiencing, or at risk for, a significant increase in hepatitis infections or an HIV outbreak due to injection drug use, (as determined by CDC), may propose to use SUPTRS BG to fund elements of an SSP other than to purchase sterile needles or syringes. States interested in directing SUPTRS BG funds to SSPs must provide the information requested below and receive approval from the State Project Officer. Please note that the term used in the SUPTRS BG statute and regulation, *intravenous drug user* (IVDU) is being replaced for the purposes of this discussion by the term now used by the federal government, *persons who inject drugs* (PWID).

States may consider making SUPTRS BG funds available to either one or more entities to establish elements of a SSP or to establish a relationship with an existing SSP. States should keep in mind the related PWID SUPTRS BG authorizing legislation and implementing regulation requirements when developing its Plan, specifically, requirements to provide outreach to PWID, SUD treatment and recovery services for PWID, and to routinely collaborate with other healthcare providers, which may include HIV/STD clinics, public health providers, emergency departments, and mental health centers⁴. SAMHSA funds cannot be supplanted, in other words, used to fund an existing SSP so that state or other non-federal funds can then be used for another program.

- ¹ Section 1923 (b) of Title XIX, Part B, Subpart II of the PHS Act (42 U.S.C. § 300x-23(b)) and 45 CFR § 96.126(e) requires entities that receive SUPTRS BG funds to provide substance use disorder (SUD) treatment services to PWID to also conduct outreach activities to encourage such persons to undergo SUD treatment. Any state or jurisdiction that plans to re-obligate FY 2020-2021 SUPTRS BG funds previously made available such entities for the purposes of providing substance use disorder treatment services to PWID and outreach to such persons may submit a request via its plan to SAMHSA for the purpose of incorporating elements of a SSP in one or more such entities insofar as the plan request is applicable to the FY 2020-2021 SUPTRS BG funds *only* and is consistent with guidance issued by SAMHSA.
- ² Section 1931(a(1)(F) of Title XIX, Part B, Subpart II of the Public Health Service (PHS) Act (42 U.S.C.§ 300x-31(a)(1)(F)) and 45 CFR § 96.135(a) (6) explicitly prohibits the use of SUPTRS BG funds to provide PWID with hypodermic needles or syringes so that such persons may inject illegal drugs unless the Surgeon General of the United States determines that a demonstration needle exchange program would be effective in reducing injection drug use and the risk of HIV transmission to others. On February 23, 2011, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services published a notice in the Federal Register (76 FR 10038) indicating that the Surgeon General of the United States had made a determination that syringe services programs, when part of a comprehensive HIV prevention strategy, play a critical role in preventing HIV among PWID, facilitate entry into SUD treatment and primary care, and do not increase the illicit use of drugs.

- ⁴ Section 1924(a) of Title XIX, Part B, Subpart II of the PHS Act (42 U.S.C. § 300x-24(a)) and 45 CFR § 96.127 requires entities that receives SUPTRS BG funds to routinely make available, directly or through other public or nonprofit private entities, tuberculosis services as described in section 1924(b)(2) of the PHS Act to each person receiving SUD treatment and recovery services.

Section 1924(b) of Title XIX, Part B, Subpart II of the PHS Act (42 U.S.C. § 300x-24(b)) and 45 CFR 96.128 requires "designated states" as defined in Section 1924(b)(2) of the PHS Act to set- aside SUPTRS BG funds to carry out 1 or more projects to make available early intervention services for HIV as defined in section 1924(b)(7)(B) at the sites at which persons are receiving SUD treatment and recovery services.

Section 1928(a) of Title XXI, Part B, Subpart II of the PHS Act (42 U.S.C. 300x-28(c)) and 45 CFR 96.132(c) requires states to ensure that substance abuse prevention and SUD treatment and recovery services providers coordinate such services with the provision of other services including, but not limited to, health services.

⁵Department of Health and Human Services Implementation Guidance to Support Certain Components of Syringe Services

Programs, 2016 describes an SSP as a comprehensive prevention program for PWID that includes the provision of sterile needles, syringes and other drug preparation equipment and disposal services, and some or all the following services:

- · Comprehensive HIV risk reduction counseling related to sexual and injection and/or prescription drug misuse;
- HIV, viral hepatitis, sexually transmitted diseases (STD), and tuberculosis (TB) screening;
- Provision of naloxone (Narcan?) to reverse opiate overdoses;
- · Referral and linkage to HIV, viral hepatitis, STD, and TB prevention care and treatment services;
- Referral and linkage to hepatitis A virus and hepatitis B virus vaccinations; and
- Referral to SUD treatment and recovery services, primary medical care and mental health services.

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Program Guidance for Implementing Certain Components of Syringe Services Programs, 2016 includes a **description of the elements of an SSP** that can be supported with federal funds.

- Personnel (e.g., program staff, as well as staff for planning, monitoring, evaluation, and quality assurance);
- Supplies, exclusive of needles/syringes and devices solely used in the preparation of substances for illicit drug injection, e.g., cookers;
- · Testing kits for HCV and HIV;
- Syringe disposal services (e.g., contract or other arrangement for disposal of bio- hazardous material);
- Navigation services to ensure linkage to HIV and viral hepatitis prevention, treatment and care services, including antiretroviral therapy for HCV and HIV, pre-exposure prophylaxis, post-exposure prophylaxis, prevention of mother to child transmission and partner services; HAV

and HBV vaccination, substance use disorder treatment, recovery support services and medical and mental health services;

- Provision of naloxone to reverse opioid overdoses
- Educational materials, including information about safer injection practices, overdose prevention and reversing an opioid overdose with naloxone, HIV and viral hepatitis prevention, treatment and care services, and mental health and substance use disorder treatment including medication-assisted treatment and recovery support services;
- Condoms to reduce sexual risk of sexual transmission of HIV, viral hepatitis, and other STDs;
- · Communication and outreach activities; and
- · Planning and non-research evaluation activities.

Wisconsin does utilize funding to support prevention and outreach programs through provision of staff for harm reduction, overdose prevention, and disease prevention services. Funded services include providing educational information and promotion, support, and navigation to connect individuals to MH and SUD services along with HIV, Viral Hepatitis A and B, STD, and TB screening and referral for testing and medical treatment as indicated. Funding is utilized to provide Naloxone and supplies exclusive of needles/syringes.
